WHAT WILL <u>SB 972</u> DO?

- Allows Connecticut residents to communicate with their incarcerated loved ones at no cost
- Prohibits the state from taking kickbacks from its prison telecom vendor
- Protects in-person visits for Connecticut residents with incarcerated loved ones

Administrators have just renewed the contract with new rates that would make the state 45th.

Connecticut residents pay \$0.21 - \$0.325 per min compared to \$0.029 per min in Rhode Island.

Cost of providing call service in prisons

To make up for kickbacks, Connecticut needs to allocate \$8.3M to provide families call service.

- COVID-19 has worsened the cost burden of calls as visits are restricted and families struggle financially.
- Every child deserves to hear "I love you" from their parent. Communication is critical to reducing the trauma suffered by the 1 in 28 children whose parents are incarcerated.
- Communication with loved ones outside interrupts the toxicity inside prisons. When people are supported, they become committed to their own success and engage in rehabilitative practices.
- No program is more effective at improving reentry success than communication that strengthens relationships between incarcerated people and their support networks.
- Shifting the cost of core state functions onto families, particularly low-income women of color, misrepresents state priorities and is not effective, sustainable, or ethical.
- The positive social and fiscal benefits associated with communication significantly outweigh its costs.
